Dear Parents & Students,

I hope everyone had an enjoyable and fun filled summer. I am looking forward to a delightful year for us all. This week we are focusing on getting to know each other. The students will create our first bulletin board titled, "Falling For Unique Traits." Students will be asked to bring in 4 items from home that reflects who they are. We will attach them to Fall Leaves and display them for each to see how we are all unique in many different ways. Our class will also fill out interest surveys to find out things they have in common with each other. This also helps me to learn about everyone at the same time. We will discuss and implement our classroom rules, as well as begin exploring the subject areas. Students had summer reading to complete (Island Of The Blue Dolphins); they will be graded on their knowledge of the story and characters within the next week. So, as you can see we are full steam ahead into the new school year. I would also like to have each child bring in an empty Pringles can on Tues. Sept. 8th, so that we can create time capsules. Homework / Agenda Books

Students will be given an **agenda book** in which to write down all assignments. Homework is an important aspect of the learning process. Students are responsible for making sure the assignments are properly written and appropriate materials are taken home each day. It is a good idea to have extra supplies at home for your child as well. Homework is expected to be returned the following day along with the agenda book. If there is a problem, I ask that you send in a note. Otherwise, points will be taken off for work not completed on time. Generally, homework will be given Monday - Thursday. If your child is absent from school, they will be given 2 days to make up missed work. The agenda books are also used to write down general information and reminders. I may also use them if I need to write a personal note, and you may do the same. The students will also have a "**Home**" folder. It will be used for notices, monthly calendars, homework sheets, corrected work, graded papers, parent/teacher communication, etc. **Please be sure to check both each night.**

Student /Classroom Supplies

The following is a small list of supplies each student will need to bring in.

- A pencil box or bag
- Pencils and erasers
- Erasable pens - blue or black ink
- 2 one subject notebooks
- colored pencils or crayons
- 4 book covers or **jumbo** book sox

We are always in need of replenishing our classroom supplies throughout the year as well.

Projects

Throughout the year, students will have various projects, such as Book Reports, Science Experiments, and Social Studies biographies and projects, just to name a few. They will be given written directions as well as the grading system as a guide to follow. Students will have ample time to work on given projects.

Rules and Behavior

A copy of our classroom rules is enclosed. I ask that you please review it with your child, sign it, and return it to school. We have reviewed the list in class and discussed the importance of following rules so that we are able to create a friendly, safe, and respectful environment for all.

Volunteers

I am always looking for volunteers throughout the year to help in the classroom, with special projects, and on field trips. If this is something you'd be interested in, let me know and I can get in touch with you. You will first need to fill out proper paperwork with the office.

Subject Areas

This week we will begin exploring each subject area. Below is a quick overview of what we will be learning.

Reading - The students will be exposed to many genres. I hope to instill a love of reading with the different literature in the reading series as well as novels. Students will learn various strategies to help strengthen their comprehension of what they read.

Math - The students need to practice their multiplication facts daily. They will also learn long division, as well as fractions. In studying fractions, students will learn how to find equivalent fractions, simplifying, how to add and subtract fractions, relating fractions to percents and decimals. Students will also study algebra, geometry, problem solving, place value, and measurement to name just a few skills.

Spelling - Each week the students will focus on a spelling lesson. Pre tests will be given on Mondays and Tests on Fridays. Throughout the week, students will work on various activities to practice the words. Each lesson will focus on spelling generalizations and words the students will frequently encounter in their daily reading and writing.

Language - This is divided into two parts. Part one works with grammar, usage, and mechanics. Part two works with reading and responding to literature, writing for specific purposes, and poetry. We will focus our year on integrating the two parts together.

Science - The year will be broken up into four units. Students will actively investigate concepts and evaluate the results. The four areas we will study are Plants, Energy & Work, Simple Machines and Rocks & Minerals.

Social Studies - Students will study the Vikings, Maya, Aztec and Inca Peoples, 15th & 16th European explorations, Earliest settlements in North America. We will also focus on the political, economic and social development of the English colonies in the 17th and 18th centuries. The early development of democratic institutions and ideas, including the ideas and events that led to the independence of the original thirteen colonies and the formation of a national government under the U.S. Constitution.

Tests and Quizzes - Students will know well in advance when there will be a test or quiz. They will also write it in their agenda books. **Any test or quiz grade below 70% will be sent home to be signed and returned.** This way you are kept informed of your child's progress.

Each month I will compose a classroom newsletter highlighting important information and sharing wonderful work we have accomplished. It will be posted on the school's website. If you are unable to access it, please contact me and I will send home a paper copy for you. So as you can see we have a busy year ahead of us. I look forward to meeting everyone at our Open House.
